### **Getting Started**

What place does hospitality have in our culture—and how does that compare with other cultures that we have experienced?

Share some stories of memorable experiences of receiving generous hospitality from others.

### **Hearing the Word**

Read: Genesis 18. 1-15

Listen for Abraham's reaction to the strangers who arrive, and what the passage tells us about who they are.

### **Exploring the Word**

1. How does Abraham respond to his visitors?
2. Who are the visitors?
3. Read the other passages we had in our Sunday services:  
James 2. 1-5; Luke 10. 1-11  
Discuss what they show us about:  
welcome and hospitality  
meeting God in other people

### **Living the Word**

What is the right balance between openness to other people, and being cautious with strangers?

Are there ways that we could improve the welcome that we offer to others:  
as individuals (and families)  
as a church?

Are there ways that we could be more open to meeting with God through the meetings and experiences of our lives?

### **Praying the Word**

Take some time to reflect in quiet together, and to offer our thoughts and discussions in prayer.

A prayer based on this theme and reading:

Living God,  
as Abraham welcomed strangers to his table,  
and discovered your presence with him;  
so help us to live with open and generous hearts,  
and be ready to meet you as we meet with others,  
through Jesus Christ our Lord.
