Two ways of understanding time

"Our friends in the West often find us in Africa a little weird when it comes to our concept of time. Some people deride Africans by wanting to portray them as perpetual late comers, which is not true. What Africans are not, is enslaved to the *chronological* concept of time which is about the watch and the diary. Our concept of time is *kairological*.

Kairos is one of the words for 'time' in the Greek of the New Testament. It has the sense of:

'in due time', 'at the right time', 'the decisive moment', or 'a moment of crisis / opportunity'
